DNR manages more than 5.6 million acres of state-owned forest, range, commercial, agricultural, conservation and aquatic lands. More than half of these lands are held in trust and produce income to support public schools, universities and other state institutions. Lands managed by DNR provide other public benefits as well, such as outdoor recreation, native fish and wildlife habitat and clean and abundant water. Along with these other roles, the department regulates surface mining reclamation and forest debris burning, administers the state Forest Practices rules on private and state-owned forestlands, and provides wildfire protection for 12.7 million acres of tribal, private and state-owned forests.

The person in this internship position has the opportunity to:

- Implement a workflow to spatially index or encumbrances by survey for Aquatic Resources GIS encumbrance database.
- Convert electronic lease boundary information to geo-referenced shape files utilizing DNR's GIS software (ESRI ArcMap).

QUALIFICATIONS:

- Applicant should be a current college student or recent college graduate, this internship opportunity would greatly enhance a candidate's current solid familiarity of GIS skills, concepts and tools.
