### Burning Any Fires, Including Recreational Fires


firedanger each day of ignition prior to lighting ANY fire for instructions specific to that day and location

- Start your fire only after receiving landowners written permission if you are on someone else's property;
- ▶ Help prevent false alarms—follow the notification instructions specific to your county as given on the 1-800-323-BURN message or shown on the web site at http://fortress.wa.gov/dnr/firedanger
- Do not burn rubber, plastics, asphalt,

garbage, dead animals, petroleum products, paints or any materials that emit dense smoke or create offensive odors;

- Do not burn when local or state air pollution control authorities announce an "impaired air" or "air pollution episode;"
- Do not allow smoke or ash to create a nuisance to people residing within the vicinity;
- Completely extinguish the fire so there is no heat or smoke throughout burnt area, including below surface before leaving the burn site.

4 FEET WIDE MAX.



- In a campfire pit, camp stove or barbecue;
- ▶ Smaller than 4 feet across;
- Placed on bare soil, gravel bars, beaches, green fields or other nonflammable areas.

You must obtain landowner's written permission.

Recreational fires are not allowed on State lands except in approved designated campgrounds. Report uncontrolled wildfire, call: 1-800-562-6010 Thank You

OUTDOOR BURNING RULES ON DNR-PROTECTED LANDS FOR CHELAN, DOUGLAS, KITTITAS, KLICKITAT, ASOTIN, COLUMBIA, GARFIELD, WALLA WALLA, AND YAKIMA COUNTIES



In Washington state, more than 12 million acres of private and state lands are protected from wildfires by the Department of Natural Resources (DNR). These lands adjoin millions of acres protected by the US Forest Service, Bureau

of Indian Affairs, Bureau of Land Management, and more than 600 fire protection districts and departments throughout the state.

Debris burning, the leading cause of wildfires on state-protected lands, accounts for about one-third of all wildfires fought since 1986 by DNR.

This brochure explains the general rules and guidelines to help people burn safely and legally on state-protected lands. DNR jurisdiction applies to burning occurring on unimproved forest land, so whether you wish to light a campfire or you are planning to burn forest debris (silvicultural material) as part of an industrial operation, specific rules apply and permits may be required.

**Burning** responsibly is the best way to prevent unwanted wildfires and thousands of dollars in suppression costs.


## **Burning Without a Permit**

#### **NO WRITTEN PERMIT IS REQUIRED** IF THE PLANNED BURN MEETS ALL THE FOLLOWING:

- ▶ Burn no more than one pile at any time and each pile must be completely extinguished before lighting another.
- Create a fire break around the pile by constructing a barrier to bare mineral soil
- or at least 5 gallons of water nearby.
- the fire must be in attendance at all times while burning.

# **50 FEET OR MORE AWAY**

NO MORE THAN ONE PILE



An open fire must be on a non-combustible surface and at least 50 feet from combustible objects (buildings, fences, etc.). Fire breaks must be made around the open fire.

\* WAC 173-425-050 (5)

### When is a DNR permit required?

#### **A DNR PERMIT** IS REQUIRED FOR:

- Any burning that cannot meet all the previous standards listed in this pamphlet;
- Burning of any machine piled material;
- A DNR permit is required for burning within 500 feet of forest slash piles and 50 feet of structures.
- A permit may be required for burning debris from land clearing. Contact DNR or Department of Ecology to determine type of permit needed.

**BURN BANS Outdoor burning may** be completely suspended by DNR at any time. Such tight restrictions may be announced due to high fire danger resulting from weather conditions, specific wildfire conditions, lack of available firefighting personnel or to protect air quality.
